Executive Order Suspending Certain Provisions of Open Meeting Law

Expires when State of Emergency is lifted

June **5**, 2020

Law signed including changes to Town Meeting

Expires when State of Emergency

June 16, 2021

Law is signed including changes to open meeting law (Expires April 1, 2022) and town meeting (December 15, 2021)

Law signed allowing town meeting to be delayed beyond 6/30/2020



State of Emergency is lifted in Massachusetts





Open Meeting Law: Prior to COVID

Remote participation by members of a public body was permitted in certain circumstances

- Remote participation may be used if it has first been adopted by the chief executive officer of the municipality for local public bodies; also empowered to "opt out" of remote participation
- Local commissions on disability are able to permit remote participation even without adoption by the municipal adopting authority
- Once remote participation is adopted any member of the public body may participate remotely only if physical attendance would be unreasonably difficult

Minimum requirements

- Quorum of the body, including the chair or person chairing the meeting, must be physically present at the meeting location;
- Members of a public body who participate remotely and all persons present at the meeting location must be clearly audible to each other; and
- All votes taken during a meeting in which a member participates remotely must be by a roll call vote



Responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Meetings of Public Bodies

- March 12, 2020: Executive Order Suspending Certain Provisions of the Open Meeting Law
- In effect until State of Emergency is terminated

ORDER SUSPENDING CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE OPEN MEETING LAW, G. L. c. 30A, § 20

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, I, Charles D. Baker, Governor of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, acting pursuant to the powers provided by Chapter 639 of the Acts of 1950 and Section 2A of Chapter 17 of the General Laws, declared that there now exists in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts a state of emergency due to the outbreak of the 2019 novel



Responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Town Meeting

- April 3, 2020 Law signed that enables Town Meeting to be delayed after June 30, 2020
- June 5, 2020 Law signed that enabled reduced quorum and ability to hold meeting outside of municipal borders
- Both in effect for duration of State of Emergency

Representative Town Meeting

- June 5, 2020 Law signed that established a process whereby a representative town meeting can be held remotely, including through the use of phone or video conferencing
- In effect for the duration of the State of Emergency



After the State of Emergency

Chapter 20 of the Acts of 2021 An Act Extending Certain COVID-19 Measures Adopted During the State of Emergency

Meetings of Public Bodies

• Extends, until April 1, 2022, remote meeting provisions of a previous executive order that enable meetings to be held remotely

Town Meeting

• Extends, until December 15, 2021, the ability for town meeting quorum to be reduced

Representative Town Meeting

 Extends, until December 15, 2021, the ability for remote town meetings to be held in towns with representative town meeting form of government



Current Law Allowing Virtual Meetings

Until April 1, 2022 Meetings of Public Bodies are modified in three key ways

- 1. Continues "adequate, alternative means of public access" to the deliberations of the public body and, where real time participation by the public is a requirement of a general or special law, regulation or local ordinance or bylaw, participation with the body as well;
- 2. For reasons of economic hardship and despite best efforts enables alternate methods of compliance
- 3. Authorizes all members to participate remotely; the requirement for a quorum and the chair be physically present at the meeting location remains suspended;
- 4. All other provisions unchanged

Responding to the COVID-19 Pandemic

Executive Order suspending certain provisions of Opeen Meeting Law

- "Adequate, alternative means of public access" to deliberations and, where required by law, regulation, ordinance or by-law, must also include option for participation by the public;
- Alternative option for reasons of economic hardship and despite best efforts (only for meetings that do not require active participation);
- Remote participation authorized for all members in any meeting; requirement that a quorum and chair be physically present at a meeting location is suspended;
- All other provisions of open meeting law unchanged
